Some of the best parts of Mad at School provide us with examples of these; I'll note three in particular. First, revealing the author's sensitive ear as a rhetorician, an initial chapter entitled 'Listening to the Subject of Mental Disability' discusses the importance of the labels we choose for these kinds of disorder (although after a thought-provoking analysis of the term 'disability' the equally problematic 'mental' is rather strangely let off the hook).
